

New Art On Display - "Hope In Every Step"

A new and unusual art exhibit will be in the Chapel Gallery in September and October. "Hope in Every Step" celebrates the work of immigrant artists and is part of a larger 7x7 Galleries exhibition focusing on immigration. This juried show features work expressing artists' perspectives on their experiences: what they left behind to come to this country, their adjustment to new realities, their struggles to assimilate, and how they built community here.

The pandemic interrupted the original plan for this exhibit. The prospectus seeking entries was distributed announcing the work would be on display in 2020 when the pandemic began. We went ahead with judging the entries digitally, awarded first through third place prizes, and put the exhibit on the church website. Now we are able to share most of the 54 works submitted in a traditional gallery experience.

This is also our congregation's part of the 7x7 Galleries' first joint exhibition. Our church, First Congregational United Church of Christ, First Unitarian Church, First United Methodist Church, St. James Lutheran Church, Trinity Episcopal Cathedral and Westminster Presbyterian comprise the 7x7 Galleries. Each congregation has an active Visual Arts program and a gallery space and work together to affirm connections of faith to art.

During September and October, all seven church galleries will have exhibits about aspects of immigration and extended hours to allow members of all seven congregations better opportunities to view them. You'll see a colorful insert in your Sunday bulletin with more information about that in September.

As we look to Scripture to find a word of encouragement to help us persevere through the extended pandemic, these words from the Apostle Paul's letter to the Colossians hold a benediction for the coming days:

May you be strengthened with all power,

according to God's glorious might,

for all endurance and patience with joy,

giving thanks to the Father,

who has qualified you to share

in the inheritance of the saints in light. Colossians 1:11-12

Poet Diane Karay pens a prayer to guide us through these days:

O God, we come close to you, seeking refuge in the strength and wisdom of your sheltering presence. We have never known your love to wane or fail us. Giving to the Church? We'll Match Your September Gift!



The Trustees have issued a "matching challenge" to the congregation to help build the Annual Giving Endowment, a new component of the church's endowment.

The Annual Giving Endowment was established last year. While most of the church's endowment accounts are established through bequests or as reserves held for specific purposes like repairing the roof or maintaining the parking garage, this fund is different. It was designed

to accept Individual Retirement Account distributions, individually owned securities, etc., and this account's earnings in the market supplement church operations.

In the July Spire, the Trustees announced the account was nearing \$250,000 – the threshold it needed to reach before it could start paying dividends to the church budget. The Trustees are delighted to announce the fund has reached that goal – and believe there are people who are still thinking about making contributions.

To encourage them, a Trustee has offered to match contributions up to \$13,000 made to the Annual Giving Endowment before the end of September. As reported in last month's Spire, due to the pandemic relief legislation, there are some special tax advantages to donating securities during the 2021 tax year.



Tar Sands Oil Dangerous Load for the Climate and Neighborhoods



The Earth Care Team of FPC is participating in grassroots Clean Air Coordination with 82 other Portland Area churches, synagogues, neighborhood associations, and local organizations with technical assistance and organizing support from Cascadia Action. Those most affected by pollution invite others to endorse their actions but they make the decisions. We endorsed the letter of Linnton neighborhood in NW Portland to the City of Portland requesting that Zenith Energy's "Land Use Compatibility Statement" be denied. Zenith Energy imports and transfers oil from tar sands, among the most destructive, carbon-intensive fuels. Producing it releases three times as much greenhouse gas pollution as conventional crude oil.

Besides climate change, Zenith Energy's transport of oil-by-rail poses immense risks to the community including toxic emissions, accidents, spills, fires, and explosions. The oil is shipped through Portland neighborhoods in NW, N and NE, and along the Columbia. In June 2016, 14 train cars filled with tar sands oil burst into flames in the Gorge next to an elementary school. Winds were unusually calm that day, fortunately. The quantity coming through Portland was eleven times higher in 2019 than in 2018, and significantly increased again in 2020—resulting in an annual increase of over 200 million gallons in just two years.
