Celebration Works- Strings and Pipes Sunday, May 21st, 2 pm

The final Celebration Works concert of the 2022-2023 season will be on Sunday, May 21st, at 2pm, and will feature Brenda Brenner and Christopher Young, both professors at the Indiana University Jacobs School of Music, in a lively and engaging concert of music for violin and organ.

Dr. Brenner specializes in string music education, teaching applied violin and courses in violin and string pedagogy. As director of the Fairview Project, a program in which every first and second grader in an underserved school is taught violin as part of the curriculum, she is researching the cognitive, academic, and social outcomes of early instrumental music instruction. Additionally, she is an active international clinician, with recent appearances at the Midwest Band and Orchestra Clinic, and American String Teachers Association National Conferences. Brenda is president of the American String Teachers Association.

Dr. Young has taught organ at IU since 1991 (and was one of FPC Music Director Greg Homza's teachers). He has been a featured artist at national and regional conventions of the American Guild of Organists, and has been heard as a featured performer on American Public Media's "Pipedreams." In addition to concertizing, he presents master classes, workshops, and lectures. He has given classes and performances at several church music clinics, including the Montreat Conference on Music and Worship, and the St. Olaf Conference on Music and Theology. Chris serves as organist of First Presbyterian Church, Bloomington, and also plays keyboards with Don't Call Me Betty, an esteemed cover band whose repertoire spans more than four decades of rock 'n' roll tunes.

Their program will include works by J.S. Bach, Bartók, Harold Britton, Chris DeBlasio, Naji Hakim, Rachmaninoff, and Rheinberger. This concert is offered free of charge, as a gift to the community from FPC and CW's generous donors. A festive reception will follow, and complimentary parking will be available in FPC's garage. The concert will be livestreamed, but in-person attendance is encouraged!

Menucha Update

In 2019, the congregation and Presbytery approved for Menucha, our Retreat and Conference Center in the Columbia Gorge, to become an entity separate from the church. Nearly all of the Retreat Centers around the country that were affiliated with churches or Presbyteries have become independent entities in recent years.

Since then, Menucha has been granted non-profit status, and a group from Menucha and the church has been preparing for the transition of staff and facilities to the new Menucha. The likely start date for the new Menucha is in July of this summer. The church will continue to hold retreats like the Women's Retreat, the Labor Day Weekend, and the Session Retreat at Menucha, and Rev. Spencer Parks will continue on the pastoral staff at our church while he directs Menucha.

Women's Book Club
