# Kristine Olson Presents Images of Easter An Adult Education Class April 7, 2024 - 11:30 AM In Calvin Library

On April 7, join new member and Elder Kristine Olson for an adult education class that will explore images of Easter, focusing on the painting "Holy Women at the Tomb" (1894) by French artist Maurice Denis (1870-1943).

Known as a decorative artist, Denis was committed to religious art and sacred imagery throughout his life and career. At the time he painted "Holy Women at the Tomb", Denis was involved in a collective of avant-garde artists known as Les Nabis (a Hebrew word meaning "prophets") who celebrated pattern and ornament in painting. Inspired by fellow French painter Paul Gaugin (1848-1903), the Nabis committed themselves to using form and color to express emotions and spirituality rather than portray subject matter in a realistic style. By rejecting the Renaissance tradition of one-point perspective, the Nabis abandoned the illusion of depth, linear perspective, and modeling in favor of flat surfaces, broad planes of color, thick outlines, and bold patterns.

Through the visual analysis of Maurice Denis' painting "Holy Women at the Tomb" in its art historical context, this talk will explore how Denis and his contemporaries re-envisioned painting and the visual depiction of the Easter story. By looking closely at how women are portrayed in images of Easter, the talk will also consider the significant role women play in the life and resurrection of Christ, the Church, and the history of art.

### Stewardship Campaign 2024

The First Pres Stewardship Committee sends its appreciation for your response to the 2024 Stewardship Campaign. We embraced the scripture from Psalm 31:24 as our cornerstone for this year's theme: "Be strong, take heart, all of you who hope in the Lord."

As a congregation, you responded in faith. Last year, the Session set a goal of \$775,000 for 2024 to fund the church's worship, programs, and mission. As this article went to press, we have received over 144 pledges totaling \$760,233, which is nearly 98% of the goal. The Stewardship Committee has set April 7 as the end date of this campaign. We hope the remaining 3% will be received by then to help us fully fund the church's life and work this year. If you have not pledged yet but plan to do so, please consider pledging by April 7.

### Consider Endowing Your Pledge

This fund was set up several years ago and is called the Endowed Pledge Fund, as it designates 4% of the principal to go to the church's operating budget to help fund the church's life and mission. With gifts donated so far, the Endowed Pledge Fund presently has about \$380,960, which will allow an annual draw of \$15,000 toward the church's needs in the coming years. Such endowments continue to yield funds for the church indefinitely.

If you'd like to ensure that your giving will help sustain the church into the years to come, you could consider giving to this fund. You can begin by endowing a portion of your annual pledge and add to that over time. Some have also chosen to endow some or all of their pledge now while continuing to make their annual pledge, which is an added help to the church.

### Another moment in time from the FPC History Committee...

In 1926, FPC began a local mission project, Marshall Street Community Center, on the Marshall Street Presbyterian Church property. The goal was to alleviate poverty in low-income neighborhoods.

In 1930, the center was renamed to "Friendly House" and relocated to its present location on NW 26th and Savier. For the past 96 years, it has helped the surrounding community by providing programs and services to children, youth, the older population, and those facing homelessness.

Friendly House's Mission Statement reads: "Friendly House creates a thriving community by connecting people of all ages and backgrounds through quality educational, recreational, and other life-sustaining services."

By 1961, Friendly House became an independent non-profit organization. FPC continues to provide volunteers to serve as board members. Elder Amy Wood is currently serving on the Friendly House Board of Directors. Other current FPC members who served on their board include Cam Birnie (chair 2011, 2012), Midge Birnie (chair 1991), Doug Blomgren, Steve Chown (chair 1998), David Hawkins, David Leatherwood, Susan Miner, John Purdy and Dan Wade.

The annual Friendly House auction is on the evening of April 2O at 6:00 pm at the Multnomah Athletic Club. There is also an online auction beginning on April 15. ### Julia West Housing Project

Construction has just started at the JWH location. The property sale closed on February 9, and FPC realized \$746,970 from the transaction. As required by our Presbytery Board of Trustees, "Congregations are ordinarily to use proceeds from the sale of real property, ...for non-operating purposes, i.e. to reduce existing encumbrances; to invest proceeds in other real property or new construction."

In keeping with this requirement, the first part of the proceeds from the Julia West sale have been applied to pay off the remaining loan on the church's parking garage. This will save FPC nearly \$130,000 in annual operating expenses, allowing the church to put more of its resources to mission and programs. The new building on the site will create 90 units of subsidized low-income housing with supportive services, which will be available for occupancy in 2025. Wonderful news!

As for the remainder of the sale proceeds, the Session has formed a small study team to come back with guidance on how to apply the proceeds in line with the mission purposes that had been envisioned when the JWH sale was first approved.

We're grateful for this chance to strengthen the church's work and mission, and for the contribution to low-cost housing that is so needed in our city.

### The Art & Life of Robert Dykman



Robert Jan Dykman was born in 1947 in Amsterdam to a Dutch working-class family. Seeking a better life for their family, they immigrated America by ship when he was a toddler. The family landed in Salt Lake City, where he spent his childhood before moving to California for art school. He eventually settled in Oregon and started a family. Throughout his life, he was drawn to painting scenes of the Dutch landscape. His earlier work featured a mix of watercolor and ink, and in later years, he switched to just watercolors and oils. Another favorite subject of Robert's

was the covered bridges that dotted his longtime home, Oregon. Pastor Brenna, the daughter of Robert, grew up immersed in the artistic environment cultivated by her father. In the Early 2000s, Robert's work was featured in the Gottlieb Gallery in downtown Portland.
