Our church is participating for the third year in the Portland Winter Light Festival, happening February 2-10. This event brings communities together citywide through art and technology. The theme for our display this year is "Let Justice Roll Down Like Water." A waterfall of lights will cascade from our church and onto the plaza in an illuminated pool.

Our church is using the display to help raise funds for the Warm Springs Reservation, a community of 5,500 people that has been forced to rely on bottled water since 2017. Although the government is funding a new drinking water system to replace an older nonfunctioning one, that project will not be completed for years.

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Update on FPC's Solar Project

While diligently exploring the implementation of a solar grid on the roof of the Parish House, we have encountered a significant hurdle in our commitment to environmental stewardship. The Solar Team, comprising representatives from the Finance, Facilities, and Mission Committees, solicited bids from four contractors for the installation of solar generating panels. Through this process, we discovered engineering limitations on the downtown Pacific Power grid, preventing FPC from attaching a solar array at this time.

We will actively monitor the situation and revisit this topic if Pacific Power implements the required circuit changes. For those interested in delving deeper into our efforts towards solar initiatives at FPC, please feel free to reach out to Tom Moore, Marilyn Howe, Jenny Holmes, or Bill Resley.

Naloxone Training

Naloxone (Narcan) is a life-saving medication that halts overdoses immediately. Considering our downtown location, the church ensures the availability of naloxone in the AED cabinet for emergency situations.

We are organizing a complimentary training session on the proper use of naloxone after worship on February 25, from 11:45 am to 12:30 pm in the Heritage Room. Naloxone is administered as a nasal spray, making it easy to use, and its application is protected by Oregon's 'Good Samaritan' laws. All FPC members are welcome to attend.

Walk the Wildwood, our annual fundraiser for Kamwenge Secondary and Vocational School (KSVS) in Uganda, will take place on **Saturday August 10, 2024**.

First Presbyterian has had a relationship with KSVS since 2012 and began sending mission teams there in 2015. Our church financially supports the school through funding for teacher salaries, individual student sponsorships by church members and through our annual Walk the Wildwood fundraiser.

Our annual fundraiser has been very successful, raising about \$7000 in 2022 and over \$15,000 last year! Money raised has been used to build and equip the new Carpentry and Welding Shop on the school campus. Carpentry and Welding is one of many training programs offered through the vocational school at KSVS.

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Another moment in time from the FPC History Committee...



James Welty

In March of 1956, while James Welty was giving an organ recital as part of his audition to be FPC's next music director, a member of the selection committee, Mr. Ernest Town, had a heart attack. Mr. Welty, who had been a medic in the Navy, crawled over the two balcony railings from the choir loft to the balcony, the first of many times. He was the first to reach Mr. Town and tried to revive him, but was unable to do so. After the ambulance departed, Mr. Welty finished his organ performance. He was hired and served as music director for nearly 37 years, from September of 1956 to January of 1993.

A Prayer of Understanding

As February marks Black History Month, we remember the Belhar Confession, initially a confession of the South African church from 1986, adopted by the PCUSA in 2016 (at the General Assembly held in Portland!), which speaks of racial understanding and justice as part of our living out our faith.

Featuring Artists: Larry Gross, Sandy Gross & Joel Nickel February 4 - March 31

Opening Exhibition & Reception Sunday, February 4 11:30 am - 1:00 pm







Larry Gross holds art and teaching degrees from Concordia University, Nebraska, and Portland State. His diverse artistic mediums include colored pencil, acrylic paint, and wood reliefs, often incorporating a "stained glass" effect inspired by his teaching of stained glass. Earth and its cosmic position are recurring themes. Sandy Gross, with over 20 years of quilting experience, uses batik and print fabrics to create dynamic patterns, emphasizing craft and vibrant color presentation. Joel Nickel, an artist and retired pastor, explores geometric abstraction in graphic designs, gouache paintings, cloisonné enamel pendants, and wall sculptures. His work invites viewers to find harmony in shape, color, and form.

Together, these artists present the "Intersections" exhibit from February 4 to March 31, inspired by a quilt design. Exploring how colors, lines, forms, and patterns interrelate, the exhibit reflects the harmony and playful connections amid contrasting ideas and viewpoints in our daily encounters with culture, politics, media, and religion.
